COVID-19 Situational Update**

**Monday, September 7, 2021**

*Week of August 29 – September 4*

Mayor Domenic J. Sarno, in the best interests of our residents and business community, continues his daily morning meetings with his cabinet heads as they work 24/7 to facilitate and coordinate with all of our local, state, federal, and public and private partners in response to the COVID-19 Coronavirus pandemic.

Below are the most recent updates as reported from each City Departments.

**Mayor's Office**

- Continues to coordinate the city's efforts with all stakeholders (state, federal, hospital and medical facilities, public and private partners, etc.) in response of services, and relief and recovery efforts, measures and initiatives
- City Hall and all municipal buildings are fully reopened effective June 1, 2021
- Mayor Sarno urges residents young and old to get vaccinated
- Mayor Sarno continues his listening tour with Neighborhood Councils on potential use of ARPA funding
- Mayor Sarno and Superintendent Warwick visit schools to welcome students back to school
- City launches Department of Recovery and Business Continuity webpage for ARPA
- City expands mask policy – mandate masks for all municipal buildings
- Springfield Police Department surpasses 250 lifesaving uses of Narcan
- Mayor Sarno wins 2022 Reader Raves 'Best City or Town Local Official' – 8<sup>th</sup> year in a row
- Mayor Sarno and city officials met with Hampden County Judges and Court officials to discuss ongoing environmental conditions at Halls of Justice

  - 246 deaths of Springfield residents related to COVID-19
    - 60 deaths reported from long term care facilities
    - 186 residential deaths
    - Ethnic breakdown of deaths:
      - 99 White – 40.2%
      - 55 Black – 22.3%
      - 85 Hispanic – 34.5%
      - 7 Asian – 2.8%
- 83% of positive cases are under the age of 50 (as of September 4, 2021)
  - 55% are under the age of 30
  - 28% are between the age of 31-50
- Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH) and CDC has listed Hampden County as high-risk for COVID-19 cases
- Announced the continued need and importance of adhering to all public health, personal hygiene and social distancing procedures
- Reported that as of August 26<sup>th</sup>, 4,467,178 individuals have been vaccinated in Massachusetts.
- Will continued contact tracing efforts for foreseeable future

### **Parks, Buildings, and Recreation Management**

- Continues to maintain the \$1.5 million in Covid-19 prevention equipment that was previously installed across the city in school and municipal buildings. The upgrades have brought the buildings into compliance with the ASHRAE standards.

- Continues to review costs associated with COVID-19 response for relief and recovery reimbursements.

### **Finance**

- Continues to monitor all federal and state relief and recovery funding and reimbursement mechanisms
- Continues to review costs associated with COVID-19 response for relief and recovery reimbursements
- Continues to monitor lost revenue and deficit spending due to pandemic
- Continues proactive meetings with Josh Norman of GP Strategies to track, identify, and implement relief and recovery reimbursement aspects.
- Continuing to review and monitor all city capital projects to keep them on track to the best of our ability and to extend deadlines if needed

### **Schools**

- Welcomed back students and staff to the return of in-person learning
- To date, Sodexo has served over 8.7 million meals to Springfield Public Schools students since the program began on March 12<sup>th</sup> (meals included breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks)
- Over 20,000 laptops have been distributed to students for remote learning
  - 10,000 laptops were given out over the summer, including to our homeless students
  - 7,000 laptops were already distributed to our students before the pandemic
- iPads distributed to Pre-K students
- Out of an abundance of caution, social distancing will be implemented along with pre-packaged lunches.
- In addition to in-person learning, SPS will have a Virtual School option in accordance with state education requirements.

### **Law/HR/Labor**

- Continues to review and monitor all federal and state legislation pertaining to COVID-19

### **Veterans**

- The VA Central Western Mass & VA Connecticut Healthcare Systems are working together to offer COVID-19 vaccinations to VA Enrolled Veterans of all ages
