

Animal Travelers Disrupt Peaceful Tenor of Railroad

Union Depot Has One Dog Too Few, One Cat Too Many and an Ornerly Zebra to Worry About

Animal travelers gave Union station officials concern last week. When the week began they were lacking one valuable dog and had a surplus cat, and on Saturday when they thought their animal troubles were over they received instructions to prepare to handle a zebra.

On the night of Friday, August 30, a tan and white collie on his way by baggage from White River Junction, Vt., to Springfield, O., slipped away from the leash by which he was tied to a truck on the station platform.

Search Finally Successful

Baggage Agent J. P. Coughlin conducted a prolonged search and placed an advertisement in the Springfield newspapers. Although the dog was seen several times in the vicinity of Armory street by station employes he could not be caught, but on Monday he made his way to Chilcope, where he was found and fed by a young woman, who arranged for the dog's return after learning from the advertisement that he was being sought by the station officials. On Tuesday the collie resumed his journey to Springfield, O. During his wander-

ings he kept the baggage check that was attached to his collar, but the writing on the check had been nearly obliterated.

The day after the dog was lost a cat was found inside a cardboard box on a seat in the subway where it had apparently been left accidentally by some passenger. It was turned over to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to be cared for.
