

Wives of Soldiers In Germany Pass Through Station

Plenty of GI wives and children are being returned from Berlin these days, according to railroad officials arranging for their transportation to homes in other parts of the United States. One railroadman at Union Station said last night that they all seem glad to be home too.

When asked about conditions in the German capital, one of them made the simple statement, "you can have that place over there."

Otherwise a check at the station last night revealed that literally thousands of people are leaving the city for the week end, and for the most part the lucky travelers are heading for Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. Officials said, however, that plenty of tickets are being sold for towns on the Connecticut side of Long Island Sound.

Bus company men stated travel was nearly up to the level of last week end, one of the biggest in Greyhound history. Railroad men say that travel is somewhat lighter than it was a week ago, but a walk through the terminal early last night led one observer to believe that railroad men are a conservative lot when it comes to making statements.

There were plenty of golf fans among the luggage laden mob, and not infrequently it was necessary to duck or be slapped on the face with a tennis racket.

For the most part the travel was all outgoing, but incoming trains hauled plenty of returning business men and a few vacationists doomed to return to the grindstone routine.
