

UNION STATION, BUS TERMINALS HAVE BUSY DAY

But Traffic Is Not as Heavy as On Friday and Saturday

Anyone chancing into Union Station or one of Springfield's bus terminals late yesterday afternoon or last night would have thought to himself: This must be the end of a long week end and there must be a convention in town.

Of course, he would have been right.

The railroad reported the more active day, with extra trains and extra cars to New York, Boston and the west the rule. Hundreds of Jehovah's Witnesses went through the station following the close of their assembly at the Eastern States Exposition grounds. The 7.35 train to New York had six coaches reserved for them.

"Busy the way we like to be" was the comment by an official at the Inter-State bus terminal. He meant they dispatched a few extra busses but there was no grand crush of passengers.

Similar conditions prevailed at the Greyhound terminal, which reported three extra busses sent to New York to accommodate persons from the assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses.

Generally travel was not equal to to the movement of people last Friday and Saturday. The explanation given at each transportation center was that many persons who left the city at the start of the week end did not return yesterday, since they have vacations of a week or two coming to them.

However, that still left many persons to return home and go to work this morning. Because (as you've doubtless noticed) the people who have to work always seem to outnumber those enjoying vacations.
