

YOUNG CAMPERS FILL UNION STATION HERE

Hundreds From South and West Arrive On Special Trains

An army of youngsters, bound for camps in northern New England and on Cape Cod, took over Union station for a short while yesterday as a "campers' special" train stopped here. Boys and girls ranging in age from six to 16, from Chicago and the West, Washington and the Middle Atlantic states, flocked through the station on their way to summer vacation camps throughout the region.

Campers began to assemble at the station early in the morning as trains from the West arrived, and as noon approached they were joined by Springfield youngsters bound for the same camps. The special campers' train from New York brought 1200 youngsters in 12 coaches to add to the army of chattering children.

Majority of the youngsters were bound for camps at Thetford, Bradford, Newbury, Ely, Fairlee, Roxbury and Brattleboro, Vt., Woodsville, Bradford, Newport and Andover, N. H. Others were bound for Berkshire towns.

A camp special from the South brought 800 children into the station during the afternoon after the first contingent had been cleared out.

The baggage division of the railroad and the express company have been flooded all week with the campers' baggage, which in former years had been brought to summer camps in family cars.
